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John Winthrop "City Upon a Hill"

<p>Now the only way to avoid this shipwreck, and to provide for our posterity, is to follow the counsel of Micah [<i>Micah book revolves around two main themes: one of judgement and one of restoration</i>], to do justly, to love mercy, to walk humbly with our God. For this end, we must be knit together, in this work, as one man.</p> <p>We must delight in each other; make others' conditions our own; rejoice together, mourn together, labor and suffer together, always having before our eyes our commission and community in the work, as members of the same body</p> <p>For we must consider that we shall be as a city upon a hill. The eyes of all people are upon us. So that if we shall deal falsely with our God in this work we have undertaken, and so cause Him to withdraw His present help from us, we shall be made a story and a by-word through the world.</p> <p>But if our hearts shall turn away, so that we will not obey, but shall be seduced, and worship other Gods, our pleasure and profits, and serve them; it is propounded unto us this day, we shall surely perish out of the good land whither we pass over this vast sea to possess it</p> <p>Therefore let us choose life, that we and our seed may live, by obeying His voice and cleaving to Him, for He is our life and our prosperity</p>	<p>What do you think Winthrop is referencing when he says "shipwreck"?
